## OBLIGATORY WATER SAVING MEASURES IN HERMANUS

### EVERY DROP YOU SAVE IS WORTH TWICE AS MUCH TOMORROW

Good cooperation and support is being received from the public for the obligatory water saving measures that were introduced in November for Greater Hermanus.

These measures are mainly aimed at gardening, where the greatest saving can be achieved, and entail the following:

- Watering of gardens is limited to one hour at night between 18:00 and 06:00 on specified days.
- Households with even street numbers may water on Mondays and Fridays.
- Households with uneven street numbers may water on Tuesdays and Saturdays.
- Preferably watering should be done with a hand held hose, but automatic sprinkler systems are also acceptable.
- Exceptions can be allowed for valid reasons, but it must be granted in writing by the office of the Hermanus Area Manager. Cognisance must be taken that the sports grounds of the Hermanus Golf Club, the cricket club and the Hermanus High School are irrigated with recycled water from the sewerage works. Hermanus Primary and the Bowls Club will soon also be connected to this pipeline.

These measures will give weekenders a fair opportunity to water their gardens and allow more flexibility for people who can't be at their homes at a specific time. They do not apply to bona fide nurseries and owners of boreholes registered at the municipality. Enquiries can be directed to the Hermanus area manager's office at 028 313 8090.

Also affected will be the washing of vehicles, which may only be done with a bucket.

When announcing these measures, Mayor Nicolette Botha-Guthrie said the diminishing levels of the De Bos dam, Hermanus' main water source, have been a cause of concern for quite some time. Unfortunately, despite a good response

to the call to use water sparingly, rainfall over the past couple of months did little to alleviate the situation.

Already, use is being made of water from boreholes but, in view of the heightened demand during the summer holiday season, the municipality deemed it necessary to promulgate water-saving measures for the Hermanus area in accordance with its competencies in terms of the By-law on Water and Sanitation Services, she said.

These measures apply to the administrative area of Hermanus only, in other words to all residential areas from Fisherhaven to Voelklip, inclusive of Hawston, Vermont, Onrus River, Chanteclair, Sandbaai, Hemel-and-Aarde Estate, Mount Pleasant, Zwellihle and Hermanus.

Other administrative areas within Overstrand are not affected by these measures since they still have sufficient water resources.

The Mayor called on all residents in Hermanus to cooperate fully. Should these measures prove to be ineffective, stricter water restrictions will have to be instituted. Council already approved as part of the budget process an additional charge of 20 percent on water tariffs when the dam level drops to 40 percent and another surcharge of 20 percent when it drops to 20 percent.

The municipality will also embark on an information campaign to promote water-wise gardening and the harvesting of rainwater.

Every drop you save today is worth twice as much tomorrow, the Mayor said

Overstrand Municipality has made significant progress in implementing specific water conservation and demand management interventions over the last number of years. It is following its Water Demand Management Strategic Implementation Plan, and several detailed studies were completed as part of the implementation of the plan.

## BLUE FLAG BEACHES READY AND WAITING

Overstrand retained its three Blue Flag beaches – Grotto, Hawston and Kleinmond – for the 2010/2011 season, and Mayor Nicolette Botha-Guthrie went to Mossel Bay on Thursday 28 October 2010 to receive this award from the Minister of Environmental Affairs, Mr Marthinus van Schalkwyk.

The presentation coincided with the tenth anniversary of the Blue Flag programme in South Africa. Grotto Beach was part of the programme from the outset, although it only enjoyed pilot status during the first year.

"Blue Flag status gives tourists peace of mind as far as factors such as water quality, clean ablution facilities and safety are concerned and definitely contributes to an increase in revenue for the area. The investments we make in Blue Flag beaches are definitely more than worth our while", Mrs Botha-Guthrie said.

According to the Minister, tourism figures for the first seven months of the year (compared to the same period during 2009) show an increase of 18,1% in foreign visitors. The figure is 4,5 million as opposed to 3,8 million for the same period last year.

Overstrand is geared for the huge annual influx of holidaymakers who will be relaxing in our coastal towns. More than 220 000 people are expected during the peak period between

Christmas and New Year and although this will be a welcome economic injection for the area, it will once more put pressure on our services.

A lot of effort went into preparing for the holidays, Mayor Nicolette Botha-Guthrie said. In all administrative areas, huge numbers of temporary workers have been employed to ensure good service delivery, also as far as law enforcement on our beaches are concerned.

As a holiday destination, Overstrand has no equal as far as experiencing nature and outdoor activities are concerned. Holidaymakers' cooperation will, however, be required in order to ensure that everyone has a good time and that those things that add value to holidaying here are preserved for many years to come.

An appeal is made to everyone to use water and electricity sparingly, to keep traffic safety in mind and to take the necessary measures to curb crime.

Dogs and baboons may cause a nuisance, and visitors should take cognisance of the by-laws restricting these animals' movements. Refuse should be placed in problem-animal resistant bins and baboons should not be fed under any circumstances.

# CLEANEST TOWN AND OTHER AWARDS

With six awards in recent times and recognition from the United Nations for its work in the area of disaster management, one would be justified in saying that Overstrand is firmly on the road to success.

The biggest feather in our cap is the trophy for the Cleanest Town in the Western Cape which has been awarded to Overstrand for the second year running. The municipality was crowned winner in this competition four times over the past eight years.

The results of last year's national competition with prize money of R1 million for the Cleanest Town are still awaited. This year, Overstrand once more reached the finals in this competition.

A mere two days earlier, on Tuesday 12 October, Overstrand was designated Local Housing Authority by the South African Housing Foundation. According to the certificate, this recognition was accorded for the affordable and environmentally friendly houses of a high quality which are delivered to the community under difficult circumstances. Mention was also made of the fact that local

labour and resources have been harnessed to deliver the project on time and within budget.

A couple of weeks earlier, former mayor, Mr Theo Beyleveldt, received an award during the annual conference of the South African Planning Institute for Overstrand's contemporary and multi-faceted approach to the challenges associated with urban growth, thereby rewarding the municipality's groundbreaking work with the compilation of a growth management strategy.

At an event coinciding with the Planning Conference, the municipality became one of the first two African cities to put its weight behind the United Nation's World Disaster Reduction Campaign. In so doing, Overstrand committed itself to follow a ten-point list of essential steps aimed at offering better resistance against environmental disasters.

In November, the paving of the streets around Market Square received the regional and national award from the Concrete Manufacturers' Association. This award is made every second year.

# PARKING SERVICES REVAMPED

More than 72% of the respondents interviewed during a recent survey indicated that they will cooperate with and support an efficient parking system in the Hermanus Central Business District.

It is realised that most towns in our country with a similar infrastructure have a parking service that requires motorists to pay for their parking in the CBD. This system provides everyone with the opportunity to find parking, especially where parking space is limited. In the absence of an efficient parking system, trade and tourism in our CBD would be placed at risk.

In view of this, the parking services delivered in the CBD of Hermanus by Buyambo since August 2007 have been evaluated by Overstrand Municipality recently to ascertain whether our objectives are being met. Shortcomings were identified and are being addressed.

One of the first steps was to request Buyambo to issue the parking marshals with distinguishable blue bibs to avoid confusion with informal attendants and municipal workers so that motorists can be sure who to pay.

Every new system requires time to develop to a stage where it can be described as being efficient or satisfactory. It is with this in mind that the following information is provided to ensure continued cooperation from motorists and to improve the service in Hermanus to a level that is more than just satisfactory.

## HOURS AND DEMARCATED AREAS OF OPERATION:

Parking fees are collected by the Marshals between the hours of **08:00 and 17:00 on Mondays to Fridays and between 08:00 and 13:00 on Saturdays**. Parking on Sundays

and religious holidays is free. The areas demarcated for paid parking can be seen in the map below. This will be also indicated in the areas with new bilingual **information signs** that will be phased in as the old signs are replaced.

**Free parking:** Parking bays other than the demarcated areas/streets such as Aberdeen and Hope Streets; sections of Marine Drive, Paterson, Royal and High Streets as well Church square has been allocated as free parking.

**Tariffs:** Hermanus still has the lowest parking tariffs of all the areas in the Western Cape where this system is in use. **The tariffs are R1.50 for 30 minutes and R3.00 for an hour's parking on Mondays to Fridays and R4.00 per hour respectively on a Saturday.** An adjustment in the tariffs and hours of operation may well be necessary in future if the system is to reach the efficiency levels required.

Persons wishing to purchase a **parking card** may do so at the Buyambo office situated at Astoria Village, off Main Street. This card enables one to park in any demarcated parking bay during the above-mentioned hours.

**Procedures:** A Buyambo Parking Marshal will approach your vehicle **when parking in any of the demarcated parking bays** and having ascertained for what length of time you wish to park, he or she will register this information on the machine in his or her possession. You, the motorist, have the opportunity to register the payment transaction on the machine by pressing the paid button, failing which you forfeit the right to query the time recorded on the machine afterwards. When you return to your vehicle should the time allocated have been exceeded, you will be required to pay

the difference.

**What happens to the money that is collected?** The collections registered as payment are redistributed between the Buyambo marshals, the service provider, the system provider and the municipality.

**What happens to those who merely drive off without paying?** A small percentage of motorists still choose to use the excuse that they 'could not see the Marshal' or 'they weren't there when I got back' or even 'the Marshal did not have change' when handing him or her a R50 or more for 30 minutes' parking to justify their non-payment. In future, these explanations will not be accepted as it is the motorist's responsibility to comply with the system should he or she wish to park in the CBD during the times of operation.

Should you not **'pay upfront,'** as the information signs indicate, a Buyambo Marshal will register your vehicle as parked and you will be required to pay the amount reflected on the machine on your return. Motorists failing to pay will be dealt with accordingly.

**PLEASE NOTE:** The 'car guards' and 'car wash' people's service is not related in any way to the Parking Marshals employed by the Buyambo service provider.


**Who are these informal attendants?** Up until now, numerous individuals have appeared in the CBD area calling themselves 'parking attendants', 'parking guards', etc. They are in fact termed 'car guards' and 'car washers' and as from 1 December 2010 have a specific identity, distinguishable by their orange bibs, which will also display the phone number of their coordinator. They will operate in the CBD area only.

**Car guards:** Car guards may accept **voluntary 'tips'** for watching your vehicle. They will appear in the CBD area **between the hours of 17:00 and 08:00 only**. They may not act as car washers as well.

**Car wash:** The people who undertake to wash your vehicle have their **own tariff** and may wash vehicles **between the hours of 08:00 and 17:00 only** and may appear in the **following parking areas only:** Bameys, Bientang's Cave, FNB parking, Gearing's Point, Mitchell Street, Rossi's, Savannah Cafe, Spur/Clicks and Woolworths. They may not act as car guards as well.

Motorists utilising the services of the car guards and car washers do so of their own free will and at own risk as these people are not employed by the municipality. The municipal law enforcement division will, however, be monitoring their activities closely. Motorists should not pay or give money to any person other than those mentioned above for parking.

We sincerely appreciate the cooperation of our residents and visitors to Hermanus for their part in maintaining good relations and a CBD area *par excellence*.



# UNDERSTANDING YOUR MUNICIPAL ACCOUNT

**Except for these public holidays, municipal offices, including libraries, will only be closing at 13:00 on Friday, 24 December 2010 and Friday, 31 December 2010 to reopen for business at 07:45 on the first workday thereafter. Essential services will be delivered throughout.**

## FIREWORKS TRANSGRESSORS BE WARNED!

As is the case elsewhere in the country, Overstrand's municipal law enforcers are on standby to, in conjunction with the police, put an end to the illegal use and sale of fireworks.

This message comes from the municipal law enforcement chief, Mr Marius Hendriks, who commented on reports that police stations have been instructed to ensure that the laws and municipal regulations regarding the sale and use of fireworks are enforced.

This follows on concerns voiced by animal lovers regarding the tendency of people to set off fireworks during the holiday season.

The sale and use of explosives are governed by the Explosives Act of 1956, which states that it is illegal to use fireworks:

- within 500 m of any place where explosives are stored or manufactured, a petrol depot or a gas container;
- in any building or public thoroughfare;
- in any other public place or resort, except where earlier written approval has been obtained from the local authority.

No fireworks may be sold by a street vendor or vendor at a flea market, from a boot or trailer or from a spaza shop. Only wholesalers and retailers who have been licensed in

terms of the Explosives Act and who are in possession of a valid licence issued by the chief explosives inspector may sell fireworks.

If a person is found guilty of the possession of fireworks, he can be fined R600 or jailed for 12 months.

"Animals' safety is also a huge cause for concern. The use of fireworks, especially on enclosed properties, has caused serious injuries to animals in the past since they try to run away or hide from the noise," Hendriks said.

Divisional Chief of the Overstrand Fire Brigade in Hermanus, Joe Schoeman, pointed out that the By-law on Community Fire Safety stipulates that no-one may set off fireworks within a municipal area unless he or she has applied in writing to the Fire Chief and furnished proper motivation for the application.

He added that the owner of the premises from where the fireworks are set off will be deemed to be the transgressor until the contrary can be proven.

**Fireworks may be set off on New Year's Eve (31 December) from 22:00 until 01:00 at the following venues:**

**Grotto Beach (East from the Blue Flag area), Hawston Harbour and Beach, Uilenkraalsmond Beach, Stanford's Cove and Kleinmond Beach.**
