• OVERSTRAND EXCELS WITH WATER QUALITY MANAGEMENT

TOP-TEN PLACE WITH GREEN DROP

Overstrand Municipality received five awards on Thursday 30 June 2011 at the annual conference on Drinking Water Quality in Cape Town.

The water purification plants in Gansbaai (Frans-kraal) and Buffels River near Pringle Bay as well as the Stanford Water Scheme received the Blue Drop, which is awarded to plants that achieved 95 percent or more in the national assessment by the Department of Water Affairs.

The Hermanus Waste-water Treatment Plant received the Green Drop, which is given to waste-water treatment plants achieving more than 90 percent in the national assessment.

Overstrand Municipality achieved the ninth place overall in the country in the Green Drop assessment.

Stephen Müller, Director of Infrastructure and Planning, says it is a major achievement, especially the top-ten position awarded to the municipality with regard to the treatment of waste water.

In the Blue Drop report, Overstrand Municipality scored an average of 90,5% for its eight water schemes, compared to the previous years' 66% (2010) and 42,5% (2009). A score of 95% is required to achieve Blue Drop status.

The score for each of the plants was as follows: Greater Hermanus 87,23% (up from 75,31%), Buffels River 95,07% (up from 63,83%), Kleinmond 93,09% (up from 60,08%), Stanford 95,15%, Greater Gansbaai 95,1% (up from 63,81%), Buffeljagsbaai 75,37%, Baardskeerdersbos 93,68% and Pearly Beach 94,31%.

The Blue Drop score is not only an indication of

water quality but is a weighted total evaluation of 10 different criteria, with 26 sub-criteria. The criteria include efficiency in risk management, process control, monitoring programmes, quality compliance, data submission to DWA, publication of results and

asset management, amongst others.

The average of the waste-water quality management performance at Overstrand Municipality's five waste-water treatment plants (WWTWs) was 88,8%. A score of 95% is required to achieve Green Drop status.

The individual scores for the waste-water treatment systems in Overstrand Municipality were 92,1% for Hermanus (up from 66%), 87,9% for Hawston (up from 57%), 83% for Stanford (up from 61%), 75,8% for Gansbaai (up from 66%) and 82,5% for Kleinmond (up from 66%).

The Green Drop score is not just an indication of waste-water quality but is a weighted total evaluation of seven different criteria, with 20 sub-criteria, including process control, monitoring programmes, quality compliance, data submission to DWA, publication of results and medium- to long-term planning.

Mr Müller said the municipality made excellent progress in its objective to gain overall Blue and Green Drop status. He congratulated the team who coordinated the preparations for the assessment, namely Mr Hanré Blignaut, Deputy Director: Engineering Services, and Mr Patrick Robinson (Principle Technician: Engineering Planning), as well as the Directorate of Community Services who is responsible for operating the plants in the different areas.

NIGGLING ISSUES

Misunderstandings or incorrect information often result in avoidable issues with municipal service delivery. Overstrand Bulletin trusts that the following list of tips will make your future dealings with the municipality a much nicer experience.

- Clients must ensure that the correct address is provided when requesting services.
- When a client reports a leakage at his water meter, he must check where the leakage is. If it is on the owner's side of the water meter, he will be held accountable for the callout costs. Also keep in mind that there is a difference between callout costs during office hours and after-hours.
- When a client puts in a request to have his sewerage tank pumped, but the suction point is either broken or not accessible, he will be held accountable for the callout costs.
- When a client requests that a special water or electricity reading be taken, a fee will be payable.
- If the water meter is not accessible and cannot be read, an administrative fee will still be levied.
- If a client puts in a request to have a water meter and/or reading verified, specific charges will also be levied against the client's account.
- If you make one payment for different accounts, you must specify how much should go towards settling each of the accounts. Situations such as these often give rise to an amount becoming overdue on one of the accounts which could result in interest, collection fees and increased deposits being levied.
- Incorrect references on internet payments and direct bank deposits result in the municipality not being able to allocate the monies. This could result in interest, collection fees and increased deposits being levied.
- If a client receives his account late or not at all, he should enquire at the office because the account's due date will still be the 20th of a month.

THE WORLD EXTENDS ITS HAND IN FRIENDSHIP

Soccer lovers say it was one of the most exciting finals they have seen in our area.

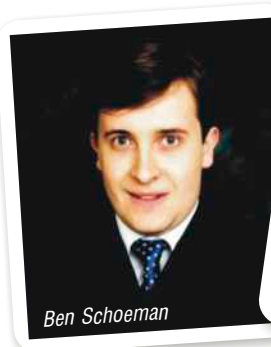
